Dear Friends

They say that moving house is one of the most stressful things you can ever go through and having just completed our second move in 3 years I can confirm there is some truth in that statement!

Moving during lockdown meant that we have had to bring literally everything with us so now we are in the process of deciding what can come out of one of our many boxes and what needs to stay in those boxes in order to be donated or recycled elsewhere. It's an interesting exercise because this house is quite a bit smaller than we've been used to so we have to be strict on picking out the most useful items and prioritising the things that mean the most to us. It will take time but it reminds us of what is most important.

In Matthew 6.19 Jesus warns against storing up riches on earth but encourages us to cultivate a mind and heart tuned into heaven prioritising the things of the kingdom of God over the things of the world. I suppose I interpret that to mean that rather than live a life that pleases only me and mine I am called to live a life where love for God and neighbour are the main priorities. It's in those values that I need to be investing if I ever hope to see a similar change in our communities. That goes for our churches too. As we ease out of lockdown and begin to think about when and how we might begin to open up our churches maybe a question to ask is 'what stays in the box?' Does our church need to get back to exactly what it was doing and how it was being before lockdown or are we learning new priorities, new opportunities, a new under-

There are many lessons to be learned and unlearned from this period and I am challenged to think of how we might build on the displays of generosity and community that we have seen and read about. I am challenged also to think about how we value and celebrate the best of what our society has to offer and how we as church can speak into some of the more damaging aspects of our culture and listen to those who have felt undervalued, ignored even persecuted.

I am privileged to be part of the network of church representatives who make up Bolton Christian Community Cohesion. We meet and pray and work in task groups (all via Zoom of course!) to see how the church in our borough can respond and be a blessing around issues like social isolation and poverty, the environment, supporting asylum seekers and refugees, education, the town centre economy and prayer.

I hope that over the next couple of months I will be able to share more with you about this and how we can all be engaged in simple ways to be an even greater blessing to the place where we live. Thinking of ways perhaps in which we can all be focussed on the primary values of loving God and loving our neighbours.

As we start to look ahead and begin the process of unpacking our churches let's challenge ourselves to think on what is really needed here and what can stay in the box.

May God's Spirit encourage and guide you in your walk with Jesus.

A letter of introduction from Rev Jacky Embrey

Dear members of the churches of the Bolton and Salford Missional Partnership,

My name Is Jacky Embrey. I am currently Moderator of the Mersey Synod and living in Liverpool with my husband, John. We will shortly be moving to Bolton to join you. John is very happy to be doing this, as he works in Blackburn. Our two sons are now independent and no longer live with us. Iain is teaching in Musselburgh, near Edinburgh, and Chris is married and living in Macclesfield.

John and I spend a lot of our spare time orienteering and walking, so we'll be exploring the green spaces round about the town, after we have moved. We also want to get to know Bolton, which we've been told is one of the largest towns in Europe and one of the friendliest. Salford is much larger than we had realised, so there will be a lot to explore there too.

In the (nearly) 18 years since I was ordained, I have worked in three different teams of ministers as well as being in sole pastoral charge. I have ministered in a variety of churches, including ecumenical partnerships and churches from the Congregational, Presbyterian and Churches of Christ traditions. I have also worked as Area minister across thirty very different churches in Birmingham, which is a multicultural city with a huge mix of needs and possibilities.

The churches with which I have worked have varied in size, in worship style and theology, and in outreach, from foodbanks to toddler groups, prayer ministry to café church and beyond. The communities in which the churches were set also varied greatly, with some deprived and others more affluent. In each case it was the people who were important, being church in their own way.

I have been privileged to be involved in the wider councils of the United Reformed Church over a number of years and so have gained a good knowledge of where to find help for local churches in different situations. I certainly don't know all the answers, but I do know a lot of people, who we can ask.

I am looking forward to sharing in ministry with Ruth and Mike and with the churches and the people of the Bolton and Salford Missional Partnership. This is an exciting and a challenging time to be moving, with the lockdown's ongoing impact on us, our churches and our communities as a background. Against this background, we will need to work out together what Missional Partnerships can mean for our church life and our relationships with our communities. I hope that my skills and experience will be useful in doing that.

 - 18. Vacuum bags arrive. No measure of course.
 - 19. Wednesday after Zoom, weigh all ingredients carefully. 245pm
 - 20. Add to breadmaker and press start. 4 and half hours baking time. Wrong flour grain not plain.
 - 21. Everything seems okay but noisy when mixing.(of course Ian is on the phone and can't hear over the noise)
 - 22. Sun shining, so go out into the garden.
 - 23. Come in to start tea.
 - 24. Switch oven on—nothing power off.
- 25. Reconnect power—has the breadmaker blown a fuse?
- 26. Look at bread, proving nicely.
- 27. Try to reset breadmaker—won't reset. What to do?
- 28. Cook tea and eat it.
- 29. Think about dough problem.
- 30. Decide to bake it in the oven.
- 31. Take dough out of breadmaker. VERY sticky
- 32. Add loads of flour to make it less sticky.
- 33. Fingers crossed it will be okay.
- 34. Find loaf tin and grease it.
- 35. Shape dough and set to prove.
- 36. Have to put heating on to have heat to prove bread!
- 37. Bread grows slowly but is eventually ready.
- 38. Bake in oven. Fingers crossed.
- 39. Take out and cool.
- 40. Eat with lemon curd. Delicious and the bread. 10.30pm.


