

Preaching Online: 10-15 Minute Sermons that Transform 1-2 March 2021

The Internet - and Zoom in particular - make it easier to preach short sermons aimed at transformation. It's not a case of simply lifting a sermon you'd preach in church and preaching it online, though!

The key is recognising how the same congregation that meets in a church building to listen to a sermon will behave very differently online.

This 2-session course explores the distinctive ways in which we behave online and relates that to how we preach differently online. Each session lasts 2 hours, with time for input and discussion. There are two opportunities to join these sessions: Day time or Evening time.

DARE (Darwen Asylum Seeker and Refugee Enterprise)

Our DARE group, which comprises of all different faiths and churches in Darwen, is continuing to flourish despite being in lockdown.

We have a dedicated team of people who make food deliveries each week and through our DARE Whatsapp and Mosque Whatsapp we are able to make sure all emergencies are catered for. Here is one example:-

One of our asylum seekers (a lady on her own with a 5-year-old child) was cold due to the electricity supply in her flat having failed and she was unable to cook a hot meal. Within 4 hours of receiving her email, the DARE Team and Mosque Team sprang into action and between us we were able to make sure she had warm food and hot drinks immediately. Someone from the mosque was able to contact her landlord to sort out the electricity problem and also one of the ladies from the mosque was able to provide a hot meal. I think without this support her flat would probably have been colder for much longer. She was very grateful for all the help she received.

Through our DARE Whatsapp we are able to respond for offers of help, including distributing bikes, helping out with IT queries and, most importantly, being able to keep in touch with people on a daily basis and responding to their needs.

Also, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Darwen, we have started to distribute hot meals prepared by the Tauheedul High School in Blackburn.

Face Masks donated by the Chaiyi Presbytery of Presbyterian Church in Taiwan

The North Western Synod has a Global Partnership with the Chaiyi Presbytery of Presbyterian Church in Taiwan. The Synod World Church Group has organised several exchange visits including a Youth Exchange in 2015 and return visit 2016.

At the start of the pandemic we received a generous donation of 10,000 masks from the Chaiyi Presbytery of Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.

The face masks were distributed to all the churches in the Synod (120) for their general use, e.g. if they were open for worship, or with any other users of their halls.

We provided additional masks to a number of churches with particular community outreach as part of their mission, so as some example:

- Darwen Central received masks to support DARE which is a long standing project working with refugees and asylum seekers who have settled in the area
- Fleetwood and St Annes churches received masks to support their work with local foodbanks who make extensive use of the church's premises
- · Chorley URC were provided with masks to support a number of the community uses of their buildings, for example their community kitchen providing food for the homeless
- St Mark's Wythenshawe (Dandelion Community) for the work through their food hub with the local community

On a personal level the gift of the masks prompted some wonderful conversations about generosity and hope as I delivered bags of parcels of masks for despatch at my local post office, and of course Radio Lancashire picked up on the gift and I was interviewed on their Sunday morning programme which provided an opportunity not just to celebrate the wonderful gift with a wider audience, but also to share something of the fruits of the long standing partnership between us.

Due to lockdown and the ongoing restrictions, all training until further notice will be delivered via Zoom.



The next session is Tuesday, 26 February. Please encourage you young people to give it a try!





We had donations of toys from St Cuthbert's C of E church in Darwen and St Joseph's Catholic church in Darwen; sweets and selection boxes from Lindt and friends of DARE; biscuits and cakes from our church at Central, with some of the older ladies lovingly baking cakes for the hampers, and toiletries from Central. We also got a very generous donation of toiletries from our muslin friends at Darwen Mosque with whom our Church is twinned as part of a pilot mosque-twinning project. The generosity of spirit was definitely in abundance as we all packed the bags together. The hampers were delivered the same day and it was lovely to see Aslam from the mosque turn up to help with the deliveries in the middle of his taxi rounds.






Knitting project: Revidge Fold URC

Many years ago there was one of Revidge Fold congregation members who made up squares into blankets and then sent them off to a Charity. They would be displayed in Church some Sunday's. The lady, Molly Airey, who inspired me to knit squares, was a legend and dearly loved by many.

Originally in March I had the thought that our Congregation and guests of Lunch Club, Tuesday @ 2 groups would possibly find knitting blankets for others something they could do during lockdown. Firstly to keep themselves occupied and secondly that they would feel useful knitting for others. Knitters have come and gone, moving onto other tasks but at least 12 people have clicked their knitting needles. At present we have 7 people still knitting them. My 'Slogan' has been - a square a day keeps the boredom away.

A lady in our Congregation is a member of the Inner Wheel (the female counterpart of the Rotary). I knew that the group have an International Outreach and in the past made blankets to send abroad. So, I asked her if there was anyone who could make the knitted squares into blankets then pass them on for us. Well kindly they have done this and when the latest squares are complete we will have donated 4 blankets to Charity. Two ladies who are still knitting are in their late 80's in fact one may have gone 90 this year. They are constantly requesting more wool. Every little helps doesn't it. Anne Dolphin



Knitting Project: Trinity Great Harwood (LEP)

The knitters of Trinity URC Methodist Church along with the WI of Great Harwood, are joining in with the Cumbrian Way Homeless Scarf Challenge. The aim is that through the whole of 2021 enough scarves can be knitted or crocheted that would cover the length of the Cumbrian Way, approx 75 miles, and it's estimated this will take something like 73,000 scarves. When completed the scarves can be given to the homeless in our own area and a photo sent to the organizers in Cumbria so that each one can be added to the total. The WI know of 28 homeless men and women living in Blackburn or Accrington. Scarves should be in double knitting wool and about 6ins wide and 60 ins long and can be any colour or design although it's suggested that darker colours are better. Christmas in Bolton and Salford

Many of the churches were involved in the Bolton Churches' Christmas Initiative displaying banners and sending cards saying:



Most were also involved in providing Christmas Dinner on Jesus, and in packing and distributing the many boxes and bags that went to giving over 5000 folk a bumper Christmas meal and many other tasty treats including 2565 selection boxes for the children!



Christchurch hung angels in bags with a Christmas message on their railings and invited folk to take one. Over three hundred vanished as soon as they were put up – including one personal delivery to a family without a car, living too far away to pick one up.



They also put up posters showing what Christmas meant to them.



Patricroft and Worsley Road in Salford invited folk to tie ribbons to their railings in memory of someone. When these are taken down, they will be put together in displays in their memorial gardens.



All in all the churches did have a very different Christmas, but the message still went out not least over zoom where **Rosehill** used the URC's Advent boxes to give the junior church members (and their parents) a taste of God's messangers, using extra craft packages that had been delivered as well as the Advent boxes.
