Safeguarding training dates February to April 2022

Many Partnerships and Churches are planning to engage with the Labyrinth in the next few weeks on Away days, Lent and Easter celebrations etc. The beauty of a Labyrinth is that we can engage with it indoors and outdoors (an excellent way to engage with the community in your Eco Garden)

Labyrinths designed to enable a spiritual journey - an ancient and powerful spiritual exercise. It's why you'll often find them within medieval cathedrals, for example. They've experienced a revival in recent years, particularly during lockdown. You journey into the centre of the labyrinth to meet Jesus, and finally wend your way back out re-engage with the world, refreshed, revitalised, and nourished. If you haven't experienced labyrinths before, or would like to get ideas about the different ways you can use them, this is a workshop for you.

- Experience a labyrinth finger tracing meditation
- Other ideas for using labyrinths for personal use and with the public including spaces like gardens, carparks, schools, church halls etc

A Year with Luke's Jesus

A 4-session overview of Luke's gospel for ministers and lay preachers

Dear colleagues and fellow-disciples

Translation

I have spent much of the past six months working with the Greek text in translating Luke's gospel. It has been a transformative experience! Translation occupies the space between transliteration (a "word for word" rendering of the text) and interpretation (rendering the meaning and intention of the text). You might assume that our interpretation emerges from reading the text - a linear, one-way street process. While that might be the case much of the time, the reality is that the interpretive framework we have inherited also significantly shapes and sometimes determines how we read and understand the text. It's a much more dynamic process, in other words.

Changed landscape

Within the past 40 years, archaeological discoveries in Asia Minor have revolutionised our understanding of Roman Imperial theology (the theology of the Emperor and the Roman Empire). Very particularly, they've shown us how our gospels are written as a direct and deliberate confrontation with that theology. Think of Ched Myers' commentary on Mark, *Binding the Strong Man*.

What I'm offering

Surprisingly, Lukan scholars and commentators have largely come late to this particular party. It is for this reason that, in conversation with Robert Hoch, I am offering a 4-session overview of Luke's gospel that reads his story of Jesus through the lens of Jesus' confrontation with the Roman Occupation, the Purity System interpretation of the Judaism of his day, and the hopes of the Little People for liberation from oppression.

Aim and outcome

The aim is to understand and illuminate the story Luke tells, foregrounding what Jesus and Luke (as opposed to the church) understand by the salvation of the world that God effects through Jesus - particularly Easter. My conviction is that it will transform our preaching, connecting directly to our journey of discipleship as parrot of Walking the Way and making the connections with our own contemporary context natural and obvious.

I'm offering a morning and evening session of each on the **15, 17, 21 and 28 February** so as to maximise the opportunity for participation. You're free to mix and match timings as best suits for you.

Fulwood URC

Fulwood URC started off as two separate churches – St Margaret's Presbyterian Church (1866) and Garstang Road Congregational Church (1894). The two churches united in 1968 using the Garstang Rd building and 30 year later the two-storey building was adapted to create a single story building with a multi-purpose Worship Area/Hall. The congregation has been an active member of Churches Together in Fulwood & Broughton since it was formed in 1988. Sadly, due to a decreasing congregation it was agreed that the church should close and a Closing Service was held on 8th January 2022 led by Rev Lena Talbot.

Many people from around the Synod and Lancashire Area have been familiar with the building having attended meetings or trainings etc. We have been very grateful for the Retired Ministers and Lay Preachers who have led worship for us over the years.

Although closing a church is sad, we are pleased that many of the contents have been 'adopted' by other churches and will continue to be used. The pulpit, lectern, digital piano and several banners have gone to Christ Church, Longridge. The sound system and digital projector, some chairs and tables are now at Leyland URC along with the internal stained glass window which is to be installed over the front door. The Communion table & chair, chalice & plate and table-top font have been given to Barrow United Reformed Church Primary School, near Clitheroe along with 3 suitcases of nativity play costumes. A pair of Communion glass trays was requested by a former member for her church in Chelmsford, she has recently been authorised to preside at Communion and will now be using the trays which her father used to use as an Elder serving wine. A set of stacking chairs have also been given to a local Sikh Temple. Other smaller items have been given away but look out in a later newsletter as there still some things needing good homes.

A word of advice to others – check the back of your cupboards, store rooms, cellars & lofts regularly and don't let the clutter accumulate... we are going to need a big skip!
