
EGERTON UNITED REFORMED CHURCH NEWSLETTER

Dear friends,

As I look out of my window, the sun is shining and there is no frost and no puddles on the ground. Today feels like the first time in a long time that I could say that. This has been a cold, wet winter, not helped by a gloomy outlook economically and a great many other clouds on the horizon of our world.

It's at times like these that we most need the light of the hope that our faith and our church family bring to us. It's also at times like these that we most need to share that light in whatever way we can.

Many of you are doing that in practical ways, whether by supporting Urban Outreach and foodbanks, or by providing the light and warmth of your presence both within the church building and way beyond it to so many who are finding life difficult at this time. Paul urged us to share one another's burdens. (Galatians 6:2) and whilst he was not really talking physically, that is a good starting point.

Nevertheless, we need to go much further. We need to recognise that the hope we have in Christ is not only especially needed at times like these, but also that many folk will be more open than ever to hear about it. So what can we do about that?

A lot of church members tell me that they have no idea what to say to a friend or neighbour to make them want to try coming to church. All that you have to do is to tell them what a difference your faith makes to you. Why **do** you come to church? Perhaps it's the hope offered by Christ through these dark times or the warmth that you feel from the fellowship. Maybe the worship sets you up for the week or makes you think or feel differently. Whatever brings you to church will appeal to others too.

You don't need to answer any awkward questions – if anyone quizzes you on your faith and you don't know how to answer or feel that you can't explain, just be honest and then simply ask them to come and see. All you need to do is to offer to pick them up one Sunday, or to walk with them. It's God's role to work on their response and it's for the rest of the fellowship to work on what happens when they get there.

Jesus said 'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.' (Matthew 11:28). It is that lightening of even heavy burdens that we have to offer in Christ. It's a gift worth having, so don't hide Jesus' light under a bushel. Be open about your faith with those that you know and you will be offering a gift whose price is beyond pearls.

May the sun shine on you this spring and may the light of Christ be seen wherever you go, Jacky

LEST WE FORGET



Inspirational Christian Women of 19th/ 20th Century. (6)

Hannah Whitall Smith, née Hannah Whitall, (born February 7,

1832, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, U.S.—died May 1, 1911, Iffley [near Oxford], England), American evangelist and reformer, a major public speaker and writer in the Holiness movement of the late 19th century. Hannah Whitall grew up in a strict Quaker home and had from childhood a deep concern with religion and a habit of introspection. In 1851 she married Robert Pearsall Smith, also a Quaker, and in 1865 they moved to Millville, New Jersey, where they came under the influence of the Wesleyan-based Holiness movement, a revivalist creed based on sanctification by faith and the direct experience of salvation. Robert soon began preaching at Holiness camp meetings, and in 1889 he began publishing in Philadelphia the periodical Christian's Pathway to Power, to which Hannah contributed frequently. She began preaching as well.

In 1874 she travelled to <u>England</u> to join her husband, who had gone there the year before, and the two became the most prominent figures in the interdenominational Higher Life movement that swept up masses of followers in 1873–75. Hannah was known as the "angel of the churches" both for her eloquence and for her appearance in her evangelistic addresses to huge gatherings throughout Britain. The Smiths' work in Britain came to a sudden end in 1875 when Robert was <u>implicated</u> in a scandal, and they returned to Philadelphia.

Hannah then turned to writing. In 1875 she published *The Christian's Secret of a Happy Life*, a guide to sanctification and complete surrender to divine will that was translated into several languages and sold some two million copies around the world. She became a prominent advocate of college education for women and in that regard was a strong influence on her niece, <u>Martha Carey Thomas</u>, who would become the second president of <u>Bryn Mawr College</u>. Hannah helped found the <u>Woman's Christian Temperance Union</u> in 1874 and in 1883 became superintendent of its new Evangelistic Department. In 1888 Smith and her husband moved to London, where their home was frequented by <u>intellectuals</u>, artists, and reformers, including <u>Bernard Berenson</u> (who married their daughter Mary), <u>Bertrand Russell</u> (who married their daughter Alys), <u>George Bernard Shaw</u>, <u>Henry</u> and <u>William James</u>, <u>Israel Zangwill</u>, <u>Sidney and Beatrice Webb</u>, and <u>George Santayana</u>. Smith continued to work with the British Women's Temperance Association, to preach occasionally, and to write, until her death in 1911. Article revised by Melissa Petruzzello.
