

Providence was open daily for people to view the archives. It was a special experience to meet those with deep connections to our past and to hear their stories.


We all felt very proud to be part of such a church, and so thankful to God who set us here in the first place.

URC Training- a collaboration between Children and Youth Work and Education and Learning.



Thursday 22nd June- self-care and resilience. 7.15-8.45pm. Led by Adam Scott.

This first session will focus on personal resilience or self-care. Resilience is a word we use a lot, especially recently, and Adam will help us explore what it means for us as individuals in the world we live in as we adapt and endure through times of change.

Thursday 29th June- Resilience and community-care. 7.15-8.45pm. Led by Adam Scott. This second session will focus on community resilience or community care. We can be adaptable and have worked on our own resilience, but our external environment affects us each day. Adam will help us explore what community resilience is, how important it is and how change can help us all flourish.

The Revd Dr Adam Scott is the Principal at Northern College, Manchester, which is one of the Resource Centres for Learning that offers learning and training opportunities for the URC.

Thursday 6th July- Enabling resilience (making safe spaces). 7.15-8.45pm.

Led by Alex Clare-Young.

This session will focus on practical things we can do/offer/give access to in church buildings, gatherings and community spaces. Alex will encourage thinking around how we manage space and self in relation to enabling resilience and flourishing.

The Samuel Ferguson Lecture 2023

Only a week to go until the Samuel Ferguson Lecture 2023 on **Thursday, 1 June 2023**! Please feel free to circulate the information below. Both events are free, and tickets are not required.

The 2023 Ferguson lecturer is Prof. Willie James Jennings (Yale).

Professor Jennings is the author of *The Christian Imagination: Theology and the Origins of Race*(2010); *Acts: A Commentary* (2017); and *After Whiteness: An Education in Belonging* (2020).

Prof. Jennings will make a presentation at Manchester Cathedral at 12 noon and give a lecture at 4 PM at the University of Manchester.

Ferguson presentation, 'Considering Hope as a Discipline',

12 – 1 PM, Manchester Cathedral, followed by lunch.

Our current climate seems to deny the possibility of hope. There are a number of intellectuals who share in the belief that hope is an inappropriate intellectual gesture for two fundamental reasons. First, the climate emergency, the ravages of capitalist logics, the relentless power of white supremacy, and the constant demonization and violence against LGBTQIA communities, along with several other constant struggles suggest intractable problems. Secondly, the facile optimism of liberal democracy has been shown to offer limited ways forward through these struggles. Yet Christian hope should be situated differently than the optimism of liberal democracy or the worldly wisdom of hopelessness. Christian hope is not a feeling or a sentiment or even an intuition. It is a discipline and in this brief presentation I will consider the significance of hope as a discipline.

Ferguson lecture, 'A Good Assimilation: Christian Faith and the Expansions of Identity',

4-5.30 PM, conference room C1.18 in the Ellen Wilkinson building (no. 77 on the <u>campus</u> <u>map</u>) at the University of Manchester, followed by a reception.

This lecture considers the problem of assimilation for Christianity and its horrific legacies that yet haunt the present. Assimilation is the drawing of one into another. Christianity in the western world promoted a colonial and racial assimilation of diverse peoples and their lands through violence, coercion, or seduction. This tragic legacy of assimilation created a host of problems that thwart the enacting of a redemptive life together. The question I will explore in

this lecture is what might it mean to return to the idea of assimilation as the drawing of one into another and rethink the idea of assimilation from its Christological and pneumatological dimensions. My argument is that in order to think the relation of the body to land today in more helpful ways, we are in urgent need of capturing the significance of a good assimilation.



Making a nomination


Anyone under the age of 25 can be nominated and anybody can make a nomination at any time of the year.
