Michael Harvey's Acorn Workshop: 14th September

Bamford Chapel and Norden URC

Many churches describe themselves as welcoming. However, are we truly invitational? Can others genuinely benefit from our hospitality? True hospitality combines invitation with welcome.

Are we invitational churches? This challenge is presented to us by Michael Harvey, the mastermind behind *Back To Church Sundays*, who will collaborate closely with our Synod over the coming years. Last weekend Michael hosted a workshop at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC exploring this very idea. This workshop was well-attended and inspired us to consider afresh what true hospitality meant. His insights are worthy of our attention.

The idea of inviting someone to church can be intimidating. We may fear rejection, lack confidence, or feel that such an endeavour is too overwhelming. "Leave it to the professionals!" we might think. However, Michael advocates a different approach, encouraging us to extend God's hospitality through prayer and simple engagement.

Michael suggests starting small, beginning with a simple "acorn" prayer: "Gracious God, is there someone you want me to connect with outside the church today? Amen."

God stirs our hearts. He might bring a particular person to mind. Simultaneously, God is also working in that person's life. The common denominator is that God is doing the heavy lifting behind the scenes. He is just asking us to respond to His Spirit's promptings.

This "acorn" prayer also forms an acronym that underpins this straightforward spiritual practice:

- **Ask** God if there is someone you should connect with today.
- **Call** a name may come to mind during prayer, or you may meet someone informally throughout the day.
- **Obey** (or respond) when you meet them, simply ask, "How are you?" and take an interest in their wellbeing.
- **Report** share your experiences with others to encourage and learn from each other.
- **Notice** God working in each other's lives through this simple approach to everyday mission.

Please be on the lookout for Michael and his "acorn" prayer. You may even wish to try the prayer yourself!

Let's End Poverty are launching a new campaign to encourage the new Government to meet with people who are poverty experienced and understand the insights they can bring to inform plans to end poverty in this Country.

Listening and responding to the perspective that people who are poverty experienced is one of the key principles which underpin our strategy of being a Church with People at the Margins. It is an important part of how they are able to live with Dignity, Agency and Power.

As Let's End Poverty say, "The expertise of people with lived experience of poverty should be integral when new policies are created to tackle poverty.

It's not only morally right to value the perspectives of people who truly understand the impact of poverty, but it's the best way to create sustainable change. Policy makers and political leaders need to trust the insights brought by people with lived experiences of poverty to craft solutions that genuinely address the complexities of people's lives. Ignoring these perspectives is not an option if we aim to create meaningful and lasting change."

We are encouraging all churches to support this campaign which will be launched in "Challenge Poverty Week" which runs from the 14th to 20th October by asking members of their congregation to send postcards supporting the campaign.



Online Intermediate Safeguarding Training

Any person with a role in a URC church that has not completed URC safeguarding training in the last 3 years is required to complete the Foundation e-learning as a minimum, ideally individually, but it can be facilitated in small groups if people do not have access to the internet, a computer/ device or both.

You must have completed Foundation training before you can do Intermediate training. Follow this link: *Foundation Safeguarding Training*

Leading Your Church into Growth Conference





Five Friendly faces



In 2023, Russian amateur astronomer Filipp Romanov achieved a remarkable feat by discovering two new asteroids that eluded professional astronomers. With only 10,000 professional astronomers employed globally, there is significant potential for "citizen scientists" like Romanov to make meaningful contributions. In recognition of his work, the newly discovered asteroids were named in honour of his grandparents.

This phenomenon is not limited to astronomy. As the presence of traditional ministers diminishes with the decline of institutional

Christianity, the role of chaplains is becoming increasingly prominent. Prisons, barracks, shopping centres, and schools - chaplains are popping up everywhere! This shift presents opportunities for dedicated amateurs, or "citizen chaplains."

Chaplaincy does not typically require extensive religious training. Rather, it involves the simple yet profound act of accompanying individuals in their life journeys, listening without imposing, and sharing God's love through genuine friendships. Jesus exemplified the essence of chaplaincy in his encounter on the Emmaus Road (Luke 23).

My pet project for this year, titled Five Friendly Faces, seeks to informally recognize and support "citizen chaplains." The process is straightforward: prayerfully identify five individuals you know, commit to praying for them throughout the week, cultivate meaningful relationships, and share God's love through words and actions when the friendship permits. This ministry operates quietly, without badges or certificates, but it is recognized by God and brings profound blessings.

Over the past year, I have been praying for and supporting my own Five Friendly Faces and have been amazed by the results. One friend has made significant strides in their spiritual journey and recently attended an evangelistic event with me. Another has sought prayer for a loved one serving a prison sentence abroad. Additionally, a third friend has uncanny childhood connections with the URC, which feels like a "God-incidence." This practice has significantly enhanced my spiritual confidence.
