How many ... does it take to change a lightbulb?

Do you like change? Well, I guess it depends on what is changing! How was it before it changed? Did we like it how it used to be? How is it going to change? Will we like what is coming? What will be the scale of the change? What happens if we don't like the change? How does change make us feel?

Let's take one example: we visit our usual supermarket, and they have moved everything around! That would be mildly irritating for some. For others

whose memories aren't what they used to be, and those who find navigating a supermarket difficult – that could be a difficult and unwelcome change.

Another example: a farmer – could be almost anywhere in the world – expecting a certain amount of rainfall now faces more droughts, floods and severe weather. Crop yields fall, even fail. For some, there is no food available to eat; for others, food becomes too expensive to buy. Climate change.

Let us consider political change. The UK has just elected a different ruling party of government whose byword during the election was "change". How will "they" effect change in the coming years?

In 2017, the North-Western Synod underwent a change in the way the churches are organised. The Missional Partnerships of which all our churches are now a part came into being. As with all church denominations in the UK, how can we 'do ministry' with fewer ministers and smaller congregations?

The model of ministry in our Missional Partnership has changed. On 20 July, in a splendid service, we welcomed the Revd. Barnabas Shin and the Revd. Maria Lee as full-time Ministers of Word and Sacrament, joining the Revd. Mark Cowling, the Revd. Dr. 'frin Lewis-Smith and myself, alongside our Ecumenical colleagues, local church leaders, lay preachers and elderships.

As a new, larger team of ministers, we wish to hear from all churches: their hopes, their needs, their dreams. On Saturday 7 September, the Missional Partnership Steering Group will meet: the representatives will share each church's vision and discern how the ministers will focus their time.

We would like to urge everyone in all churches to think big, to talk about what they might like to see from the ministry team. Please share your thoughts with your Steering Group representative.

The quotes with which I began this article may cause a wry smile. Lightbulb jokes tend to play on stereotypes. While lightbulb jokes about the church might leave us feeling a little uncomfortable, do they confront us with an underlying truth?

Karr's quote about change resulting in no change is also a shared experience. A quote credited to Albert Einstein puts it a little more strongly: "Insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results." We would like our churches to grow, so...

In closing, let's turn to the Bible. It's full of change! In Genesis 1-2, God creates and the created order changes day-by-day. In Genesis, we read about the big names like Noah, Abram/Abraham, Isaac, Jacob/Esau, Joseph – we read the changes for worse and for good. Skipping forward to the Gospels, Jesus encountered so many people, beginning positive change in each of their lives.

If we reflect on our own lives, change runs through it: as we grew up, developed careers and families, moved house, said goodbye to loved ones...

Our God is a creator God who has never stopped creating. God re-creates us and the world around us. God re-creates us as individuals, as families and as churches. And we need not be afraid: Jesus' last words to the Disciples in Matthew's Gospel (28:20): "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

What do you think?



1 The Pearl of God



This pearl reminds us that, regardless of whatever happens to us; God is always close by.

The Pearls of silence

There are six oval Pearls of Silence. They challenge us to shut out things that disturb When approach infinity we have arrived at a place where words are not needed. You can just be yourself as you let go of the demands to need to do something. As you travel listen to your inner voice. Peacefully breathe in and out, Can you hear the beating of your own heart?



3 The I Pearl

Look at yourself in the mirror! As a grain of sand has the possibility to become a pearl, within each person there exists unrealized possibilities. See yourself as God sees you, with your inner being as the most beautiful ever seen. God created man in his own image, in Gods image he created her. God blessed them... and he saw that it was good. Make the s oss in front of your body; a beautiful creation of God

8 The Pearls of Secrets

Your secrets are in a secure place when stored in these pearls, because there is enough space for them. The deepest secrets of the heart are dreams and thoughts which we carry with us. People are a mystery. There is always something more to discover about yourself or someone else.




The secrets which make you glad are good for you. The secrets which causes you pain are good to share with someone whom you trust.

9 The Pearl of the night


Feel the Pearl of Night, the black one, which is about the darkness in your life; your fears, your doubts ...

10 The Resurrection Pearl

Night time is over and the morning has come. At the dawning of third day Jesus arose from the grave! He became alive again! Jesus was dead and is resurrected for you. You are forgiven, now go and forgive others.



11 The Pearl of God

Cup your hands around the pearl. Imagine that it is God's hands which are cupped around you. God says, "Thank you for sharing this walking-tour with me. The journey is not yet over, it never ends"





4 The Baptism Pearl

In baptism there is a promise about unlimited grace and forgiveness. The Baptism Pearl helps us to think deeply about that God gives us a context in which we always belong to Him!

Have you lost you grip? God never has! It is never too late to start again! Please feel free to light a candle for the next stage of life!

5 The Desert Pearl

Sooner or later you will encounter life's desert, which no one can avoid. The world around us is barren and desolate, a place of loss and longing The desert brings everything to its extreme. What do we really need to survive? To travel through the desert can be difficult, but we can condition ourselves to exist there. We can search for that which is hidden while teaching ourselves about what is most important in life.

Have you found a pearl in the sand? Does light exist in the darkness?

6 The Pearl of Serenity This is a place of rest in the journey

of life. In this place you may receive the zest for life and the courage to face it re-created and growing. See that you find rest in: a place, a person, an experience or a moment. It can take place in a church, in the forest, on the beach or in the mountains.

If you wish, you may sit here or even lay down and rest a while.

7 The Pearls of Love

Love is a part of every living thing, those you love and those who love you. To love is one of life's abundant gifts. The same goes for receiving love and being open for it when it comes to you. Love becomes the gift that you pay forward.

Hold the two Pearls of love in your hand and reflect upon the love in your life that has come to you and the love that you have given away to others.
