

## **Retirement of Rev'd Alison Termie**

Over the weekend of 25th–26th January, the East Cheshire & Derbyshire Borders Missional Partnership gathered to celebrate Revd Alison Termie's ministry and mark her well-earned retirement.

Originally from just outside Glasgow, Alison's journey has taken her from zoology and parasitology (yes, worms!) to teaching, theological study, and, eventually, to ordained ministry. After many years as a URC member and elder in Leicester, Alison candidated for ministry in 2000, training part-time before being ordained in 2005 serving initially in the Spen Valley Pastorate in West Yorkshire. In 2014, Alison accepted a call to the Goyt and Etherow Pastorate (latterly East Cheshire & Derbyshire Borders), where she has spent the last ten years offering wisdom, care, and encouragement to churches and individuals alike.

The farewell weekend was a joyful celebration, filled with warmth, laughter, and deep gratitude for Alison's ministry. On Saturday evening, over 100 people gathered at Hatherlow & George Lane URC for a retirement party filled with food, fellowship, and fun. As it was Burns Night, the evening wouldn't have been complete without the traditional Addressing of the Haggis, adding a fitting nod to Alison's Scottish heritage. A highlight of the evening was the ceilidh, led by the fantastic band *Frisky Pigeon*.











The following day, 120 people came together at Short Street URC for a final service of thanksgiving and celebration. The service included uplifting sung worship, and a beautiful rendition of *The Lord Bless You and Keep You* by John Rutter, performed by a singing group drawn from across the partnership. Synod Moderator, Revd Clare Downing led a poignant leave-taking liturgy, which included a symbolic handing back of keys, while offering words that captured the mix of emotions felt by both the congregation and Alison herself, particularly as she preached her final sermon.

A memorable moment came during an interactive 'retirement bucket list' activity led by Revd Jonnie Hill, when the congregation was invited to suggest ideas for how Alison might spend her newfound free time. The room was filled with laughter as people pondered their suggestions! But the real surprise came when it was revealed that Alison had already begun her retirement adventures in an unexpected way—by going indoor skydiving, setting the tone for a retirement that promises to be anything but ordinary.

The service concluded with the presentation of a cheque from all the churches in the partnership, followed - of course - by tea and cake. Thanks also to Elizabeth Hall, Margaret Dexter-Brown and Liz Delafield for their part in Alison's final service.

Alison, we wish you a retirement filled with joy, adventure, and, perhaps, even more skydiving!









## **Dandelion Community Vision Day - 6th February 2025**

I was invited to attend the Dandelion Community Vision Day by the Revd Kate Gray, Minister of the Manchester & Salford Urban Partnership and Liz Delafield, the South Area Mission Mentor. I didn't know what to expect to find from attending!

When I arrived shortly before 10am I received a warm welcome and there was a palpable buzz in the

air, people came up to me and introduced themselves and told me of their involvement at the Dandelion Community and what it meant to them.

But what is the Dandelion Community? It is a Church and Community Together, open to all – old or young, rich or poor, single, together or not quite sure! Doubters or believers! Just some of the words used to describe this thriving Community.



There are some fifty-plus organisations involved in the Dandelion Community, some large, such as The University of Manchester, The Trussell Trust, and some very small local groups. Throughout the day we heard from various members of the organisations and their role in the Dandelion Community, 'Women of Wythenshawe Network', 'Focus & Fly' a woman's photography group, 'Dandelion Savers'. These smaller groups are community-led initiatives. A representative from Manchester University also spoke about the work that they are involved with in the Community.

Woodhouse Park Family Centre, which was started over thirty years ago and leases space to the rear of the Dandelion property, continues to provide a much needed service in the area. I met the sister of the lady who along with one of our retired Ministers, the Revd Bob Day, started this project all those years ago, which is still thriving today, although struggling financially.

Mike Hart spoke in the afternoon about the hopes for the future of the Dandelion Community and its aim in becoming a 'CIO' - Charitable Incorporated Organisation - and the challenges this might bring. I met so many interesting people - there were people from other churches who had heard about 'The Vision Day' and wanted to see if there was something they could take away and use in their own

'small, elderly' congregations.

In conclusion I would like to share a few of the comments from the users of some of the Groups:

'I feel safe & secure coming here', 'this place is just the best place to be', 'it is not just a community, it is an extended family', 'I feel welcomed and valued' and finally 'more space needed please!'


## **Church Leaders' Enrichment Day: 8<sup>th</sup> February 2025**

About 50 elders, lay leaders and Ministers from around the Northwestern Synod, South and Central areas gathered at Luther King House in Manchester to explore what it means for them to be in a church at the crossroads. This was the first of our two enrichment days entitled "Conversations at the Crossroads" (The second, for the Lancashire and Cumbria areas, will be on 10<sup>th</sup> May at The Storey, Lancaster).

The title comes from the Theos report into the URC. They told us that the URC is a church at the crossroads. 50 years after its founding, the world and church are very different places from 1972 and we're at a place where we have to decide which road to take for the next leg of our journey - hence "Conversations at the Crossroads".

After an opening worship in which rucksacks were unpacked and direction sought, we were led in a study of the book of Jonah from Karl Möller, author of Jonah's Story, Our Challenge: Reading a Biblical Narrative in Today's Church and World. He lead us in an in-depth exploration of Jonah, exploring how it speaks to use today- including some of the humour it the book. Many participants reported that this offered them an interesting and insightful way of approaching the Bible and much food for thought.





There was also food for our bodies thanks to the wonderful catering team at Luther King House.

Our afternoon sessions explored the questions:

- What words can we best use to describe what church can be as we move on our journey from the crossroads?
- What words or ideas about church do you want to get rid of consign to room 101?
- What now for lay leadership in the United Reformed Church?
- What will our churches look like in 2035?

Participants reported that the day was thought-provoking and enjoyable, as well as a valuable opportunity to meet with other church leaders.

The Mission and Disciple Mentors are happy to hold further conversations with you about these questions, so why not invite us to share a "Conversations at the Crossroads Local" at your church?

# **Confronting Christian Zionism A yourchurch/Commitment for Life Webinar**

As part of its commitment and ministry to the wider church, **yourchurch** has teamed up with Commitment for Life to put on a series of webinars on issues around the Gaza crisis.

The first of these is "Confronting Christian Zionism" and will be presented by Revd Dr Philip Woods, a former Secretary for Belonging to the World Church and now with the Presbyterian Church in the USA.

Christian Zionism is a political and religious movement that supports the Jewish people's right to return to Israel. It is based on the belief that the Jewish people are descendants of the Israelites in the Bible and therefore have a divine right to the land. They also believe that the founding of Israel in 1948 was in accordance with biblical prophecy and that the return of the Jews to Israel is a prerequisite for the Second Coming of Jesus Christ.



## **Churches Together in Lancashire**

#### The AGM of Churches Together in Lancashire with guest speaker Dr Marwan Darweish

This will take place by Zoom on **Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> February at 7.30pm.** During a short act of prayer and reflection the new Chair of Churches Together in Lancashire will be commissioned. The Revd Dr Peter Colwell is the Deputy General Secretary of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, born, raised and lives in Lancashire! After a short business meeting there will be guest speaker - Dr Marwan Darweish Associate Professor in Peace Studies at Coventry University.

Dr. Marwan joined the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations at Coventry University in 2009. He is former Course Director of the MA in Peace and Conflict Studies and Director of Post Graduate Certificate Course in Conflict Resolution Skill from 2010-2016.

His current research focuses on cultural heritage peace processes, conflict transformation and nonviolence resistance. Dr. Darweish carries extensive experience across the Middle East region and has a special interest in the Israeli/Palestinian conflict. He worked for over 30 years for social political change in Palestine and Israel. He recently led a team of researchers to implement a research project on the nonviolent movement in the Occupied Palestinian Territories and the role of Israeli and international peace and solidarity movement, funded by the EU. He has considerable international experience in leading training courses in conflict transformation and peacebuilding, and in undertaking consultancies for several international and local organisations in the Middle East and Africa. His is the co-author of (2015) Popular Protest in Palestine: The History and Uncertain Future of Unarmed Resistance, London, Pluto Press.

The presentation will take the form of a conversation with the Chair of Churches Together in Lancashire whose Doctoral thesis is also on the Palestinian situation.

## • 1700<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Council of Nicaea event 12<sup>th</sup> -14<sup>th</sup> September Blackburn Cathedral.

This will take place over three days beginning on the evening of Friday 12<sup>th</sup> September with inter-denominational theological discussion on the background and emergence of the Nicene Creed. This Council of Nicaea in 325 is hailed as the first "ecumenical council" which was an attempt to bring and end to the disunity and disagreements that were harming the early church. Although not in the form that came about in 325 the Nicene Creed remains fundamental to the basis of the Christian Faith. There remain differences over versions of the Creed, specifically over the "Filioque Clause".

In this recreation of the debate Church Historians will come together from across the denominations to discuss these tenets of the Christian Faith. We are delighted especially to have Professor Rachel Muers from the University of Edinburgh and the first woman to hold the historic Chair of Divinity.

This is for anyone who wants to take seriously the reality of Christ and Christ's reconciling work in our world.


We will read aloud as a group and then, share our reactions (as we are willing) to the reading in about 3 minutes or so each, before opening to more general conversation.



The Mersey Synod of the United Reformed Church (URC) which is a charitable organisation, wishes to recruit a Property Officer, who will work alongside the 72 United Reformed Churches in the Merseyside Region, and have oversight of the properties owned by the Mersey Synod Trust. These are currently served by 16 Ministers; 16 Manses are occupied, and 4 Manses are let (plus two vacant).
