

Growing Church Together Day at Wilbraham St Ninians

Wilbraham St Ninians in Chorlton is a growing, changing church. It is a church with two congregations. There is a well-established congregation that meets in the morning. In the afternoon the Metropolitan Congregation gathers. The latter is focused around people who are seeking asylum, many on the grounds of persecution because of their LGBTQI status. In recent months they have had several new members, and the Church wanted to explore ways that they could be church together and how the new members might feel encouraged to take an active

role in church life.



The session began by sharing food together. Thank you to Cat for the delicious Pasta bolognaise.



After everyone was fed, there was a conversation about why we come to church- with people reflecting on the ways that the fellowship of church helped them to grow in faith. The next part of the day explored what gifts different people bring to the Church. People were invited to find a name to write in each box: someone who spoke three or more languages, someone who enjoyed drawing or painting, or someone who prayed every day for example. This led to an exploration of the gifts that each of us bring to church life. Also, we reflected on the fact that every new person brings something new to the church, and how the church might change because of the new people who are part of it.



After this time was spent spent reflecting on how we build a church service together and developing confidence to take on different roles, ending with a joyful act of worship together.



As Mission and Discipleship Mentor it was a delight to be invited to walk alongside this fabulous group of people on their discipleship journey.

Revidge Fold United Reformed Church, Blackburn 100th Anniversary and Final Service

Well over twelve months ago Revidge Fold United Reformed Church and Trinity United Reformed Churches voted to unite to become one congregation. As a United Church our names needed to change and we became North Blackburn United Reformed Church. At a meeting in November 2024 members voted which building we would worship in, the majority vote was to use Trinity Church building.

Members of Revidge Fold felt a final service should be held. As so often happens one comment led to another and it was decided we should have a full weekend to celebrate 100 years of Worship in the Revidge Fold building with an exhibition on the Saturday and a Service on the Sunday in February 2025.





During the three months preparation research was done. Four Lane Ends Congregational Church was opened in 1925 – although people had been worshiping in houses and the Sunday School for almost 100 years before this.

The foundation stones were laid a couple of years earlier, late 1923. All the Congregational Churches in Blackburn, probably nine or ten of them, held fundraising events to raising enough money to build Four Lane Ends Church. The whole town worked together – a forerunner of our working together as a Missional Partnership.

In 1974 Four Lane Ends united with St Georges Presbyterian Church, Blackburn to become Revidge Fold United Reformed Church.

St Georges was built by members of Mount Street Presbyterian Church who worked extremely hard to fund it.

Displays for people to look at included the history of Mount Street, St Georges, Four Lane Ends and Revidge Fold. A large number of people visited on the Saturday and again on the Sunday. They marvelled at the Faith of those people from yesteryear who gave so much to the Church and Community to bring Gods word to all.





On the Sunday afternoon we held our final service, marking 100 years of worship and service at Revidge Fold, attended by the Mayor and Mayoress of Blackburn with Darwen. It was a very memorable act of worship. The music group, formed from musicians who are past members, together with present day members, led the worship. Many people took part in the service, including our mission mentor, ministers past and present, six of whom went into ministerial training from Revidge Fold. Candles were used in prayers of thanksgiving, each highlighting different aspects of church life, with people who were involved in any way being invited to stand.

One church member reflected on 80 years of worship and service at Revidge, and another reflected on 55 years as an elder. Our community minister gave a short sermon. The service was attended by over 160 people, some of whom had travelled a long distance. Every member of the congregation was given a tealight and bookmark as a memento of a very special day. The service was followed by a buffet, over which many memories were shared, with laughter and some tears, and above all with gratitude to God for his love, provision and care. We now move on with hope as North Blackburn URC, seeking God's guidance for the future.

Deadline for Applying to the DDFLG

The deadline of 31st March is approaching for applications for **Discipleship Development Fund Large Grants**.

For the Large Grant, around £5,000 per award per year is available to recognised groups within the URC. Grants can be put towards any purpose that will contribute to the Discipleship Development of lay people in or connected with the URC. Multi-year projects can be supported for up to three vears and tapered approach funding а encouraged. Applications for grants that only partially fund a project are acceptable, but the application will need to identify the source of the other funds. Any recognised group can apply, but if the group applying is not an Assembly Committee or a Synod, it will need to gain approval for its application from their Assembly Committee or Synod. Applicants need to clearly demonstrate how the grant will be used to develop discipleship and lifelong learning within the URC.

Over the past few years, the DDFLGAG (Discipleship Development Fund Large Grants Award Group) has awarded grants to a variety of projects encouraging people's discipleship across the URC. These include:

- Funding for a Children's and Family Worker in Birmingham
- Funding for a Discipleship Development Worker at Cheltenham URC
- 2 'Leading Your Church into Growth' conferences run by the five northerly Synods
- 2 retreat days run by Leeds URC Partnership Retreat for churches across the Partnership
- Funding to take a youth group from Thamesmead to a Christian festival
- A Worship and Bible Hub in North Wales
- 'Faithful Flourishing Day' in Northern Synod
- A 3-year initiative supporting the discipleship of Trans + Gender non-conforming people in Oxford
- Funding for marginalised and minoritised families and individuals to attend the URC Holiday Forum
- A World Poetry Day in Hull, to encourage the discipleship of local church people





Churches Together in Lancashire - Some Dates to Save

Some dates to save:

• 1700th Anniversary of the Council of Nicaea event 12th -14th September Blackburn Cathedral.

This will take place over three days beginning on the evening of Friday 12th September with inter-denominational theological discussion on the background and emergence of the Nicene Creed. This Council of Nicaea in 325 is hailed as the first "ecumenical council" which was an attempt to bring and end to the disunity and disagreements that were harming the early church. Although not in the form that came about in 325 the Nicene Creed remains fundamental to the basis of the Christian Faith. There remain differences over versions of the Creed, specifically over the "Filioque Clause".

In this recreation of the debate Church Historians will come together from across the denominations to discuss these tenets of the Christian Faith. We are delighted especially to have Professor Rachel Muers from the University of Edinburgh and the first woman to hold the historic Chair of Divinity.

The Mersey Synod of the United Reformed Church (URC) which is a charitable organisation, wishes to recruit a Property Officer, who will work alongside the 72 United Reformed Churches in the Merseyside Region, and have oversight of the properties owned by the Mersey Synod Trust. These are currently served by 16 Ministers; 16 Manses are occupied, and 4 Manses are let (plus two vacant).

A small team of full-time and part-time employees and volunteers, led by the Synod Moderator, manages and administers the Property, Finances, Training, Youth Work, Communications and other activities of the Synod from an office adjacent to the United Reformed Church in Wavertree, Liverpool.

The overall purpose of the Property Manager is to work with the various Synod Officers and Committees and with local churches to ensure that all church buildings and manses are maintained to a standard appropriate to their purpose within the limitations of time and cost.

Good interpersonal and organisational skills will be required. Discretion and confidentiality is important, as is an awareness of and willingness to work with the aims, objectives, culture, challenges and Christian ethos of the United Reformed Church.
